In your first year, academic advising resources have been directly available to you in the Academic Advising Centers and through evening RHAT programs. After you leave Student Housing, you will have to be proactive and seek advice from a variety of campus resources.

Where Can I Go For Academic Advising Next Year?

1. College Dean's Office: Advisers will help you stay on track with your university and college requirements, scheduling, choosing a major, and advise you on a variety of academic topics.

2. Department Office (Major Advising): If you have decided on a major, get to know the peer, staff, and faculty advisers in your major and their office hours. They can help you plan out your schedule and be your primary resources for major decisions.

If you are undeclared, find the offices and advisers for several departments of interest. Talking with a number of advisers can help you explore those majors with a purpose and help you find the major that is the right match for you.

3. Pre-Professional/Pre-Graduate Advising: Are you interested in graduate school or other pre-professional programs after graduation from UC Davis? The Student Academic Success Center offers advising if you want to prepare to apply for graduate school, teaching credential programs, law school or business school. 4. Undergraduate Research Opportunities: You can visit the Undergraduate Research Center (undergraduateresearch.ucdavis.edu). The URC provides advising, educational programs and workshops to help you identify a plan of when to become involved and guide you through various options of how you might go about pursuing a research project.

5. Internship and Career Center (iccweb.ucdavis.edu). The ICC offers group advising sessions throughout the week covering a variety of topics including finding a job or internship, interview skills and resume writing and review. The ICC also offers one-on-one advising to UC Davis students through scheduled appointments.

How Can I Get The Most Out Of My Education?

- Utilize office hours and try to get to know your professors and teaching assistants.
- Learn about and use Canvas for your courses.
- Download the UC Davis Mobile App for your iPhone (ucdavis.edu/social-media/mobile.html). The UC Davis Mobile App provides maps and directions, a class search feature, campus parking information, a real-time GPS tracking of Unitrans buses and more.
- Form study groups in your classes. This can be a great way to improve your knowledge about a subject and to make new friends.
- Find a good study spot outside of the residence halls. Instead of going back to your room between classes, find comfortable areas on campus or in town where you can study effectively.
- Visit the Student Academic Success Center (2205 Dutton Hall, sasc.ucdavis.edu) for writing assistance, tutoring, and study skills workshops.
